

WRITTEN IN STONE

Do you remember the day that The Rolling Stones stopped in Statesboro to play at the then-named Georgia Southern College? It was May 4, 1965, and when The Stones finally rolled out of town, they had left behind Mick Jagger's harmonica, a box office knee-deep in cash—though tickets were only \$2.50—and a great story. In *The Heeey Baby Days of Beach Music*, a new (and massive) 552-page coffee table anthology of swingin' R&B from the Southeast, Atlanta author Greg Haynes recalls this story and more from his days of band promotion in the late 1960s.
